# Oral Health & Overall Health

Studies show regular visits to the dentist are important to maintaining your overall health. More than 120 diseases may be first detected by a dental exam because symptoms often appear in the mouth.<sup>1,2</sup> Below are just a few examples of the mouth and body connection. Be sure to brush your teeth twice a day, floss daily and visit your dentist regularly.3 Early detection can make treatment easier, less costly and may even be lifesaving.

#### **BRAIN**

Studies have shown a connection between bacteria associated with periodontal disease and the progression of Alzheimer's disease.5

## **HEART**

People with gum disease may have a higher risk for heart disease when compared to those with healthy gums, according to the American Academy of Periodontology.5

### LUNGS

Research has found that bacteria associated with gum disease has been linked to a higher risk of respiratory diseases such as pneumonia.4

## **INTESTINES**

Inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) may cause ulcers in the mouth.6

#### **KIDNEYS**

If you have kidney disease, take extra care of your teeth and gums. Kidney disease may cause mouth problems such as bad breath.7
